- Drafted & Ranked Problem Statements
- Fines and fees as currently administered incarcerate too many people. They cause an unequal application of justice. (25)
- The police department is not following all national standards for data collection, nor making data readily available. (18)
- Some citizens do not trust police because of an apparent lack of accountability and transparency.(13)
- Biases in police policies and practices have a negative impact on some people (7)



- Drafted & Ranked Problem Statements
 - One size fits all policing. (6)
 - Implicit bias in police officers and communities has a negative impact on some people. (1)



Next Steps: For each problem statement

• Identify the objectives – the <u>underlying value</u> <u>statements</u> that will be used to evaluate any solution.

A solution is WHAT you want to do, an objective is WHY you want to do it.



Example

Problem statement: Roaming dogs in the neighborhood are making it difficult to be outside and to walk to the bus stop.

What are the <u>shared values</u> that we might have about any proposed solution?

- Tulsans should be able to <u>safely commute</u> to work and errands
- Neighbors should be able to enjoy outside yards free from dog attacks
- Neighbors should have <u>free enjoyment of the park</u>
- People should obey the law
- Pets should be <u>spayed/neutered</u>
