PS 1: Fines and fees as currently administered incarcerate too many people. They cause an unequal application of justice.

## **OBJECTIVES**

- That it improves equity and equality as applied.
  - Increase ability for court to consider individual circumstances of the defendant.
  - \$100 is not the same punishment to every person
  - o Fair, balanced, and reasonable
- Any solutions should be <u>balanced</u> between needs of community and the need to reduce crime and protect citizens.
  - Shouldn't undermine compliance Increase compliance with the law.
- That the solution not exacerbate a criminal justice involvement cycle. Access to the courts. Ability to pay. Decrease incarceration for inability to pay
- That the solution be accessible to everyone involved. Meet the needs of those who have trouble showing up to court.
- Meet the needs of those who have different financial resources.
- Increase flexibility of the court in administering the penalty, to consider defendant's circumstances.
- Financial burden of administering courts shift from general government to the courts themselves. Police can be incentivized to infractions because of the shift. <u>Any solution should not have an incentive to writing citations.</u> Should not incentivize certain infractions that have higher fees. (Save this for our data PS)
- Avoid unintended consequences by creating another structure that criminalize others. Any solution should avoid creating fees on

- the people who cannot pay. Avoid criminalizing people who cannot pay.
- Solution should be viewed with an equity lens
- Appropriate discretion should be present. Any solution should allow appropriate discretion that is balanced, taking into account the circumstances of the case and defendant.
- Transparency to the public. Track officers fines and fees so we can see what communities are affected. (Save for data PS)
   Increase transparency to the public
- Accessibility and clarity of the process. <u>Any solution should</u>
  adequately notify person of oustanding fine or fee. So it won't
  spiral out of control. Increase the number (the quality of )of
  notices to defendant of court action.
  - People should know they have fines
- The solution should be <u>effective</u> in encouraging compliance with the law. Increase compliance with the law.
- Any solution should <u>not promote the use of fees as revenue</u> generator. Reduce the dependence of municipality on revenue for operations.
- Any solution should provide an opportunity for defendant to <u>address underlying problems</u> that caused the arrest. Address <u>underlying social problems</u>

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- Any solution should provide <u>access to courts and resources</u> so the fine won't spiral out of control.
- Any solution should Make it easy to pay.
  - Multiple payment centers
  - Multiple ways to pay non financial and financial
  - Multiple options for payment
  - Increase ease of compliance with the judgment

## Increase access to court and services

- Any solution should provide a <u>path to expungement</u> Provide a path to expungement
- Any solution should demonstrate <u>respect</u> to the defendant Demonstrate respect for the defendant
- Any solution should be based on facts
- Any solution should consider the true costs to city, defendant, society.
- Any solution should have a net zero on criminal activity.

- Night and weekend court
- Payment plan options
- Community service options with after hours and weekend and family friendly options
- Call in court
- Public kiosk for court connection
- Public kiosk for payment
- Increase specialty court options
- Cease enforcement for fine and fee warrants
- Stop issuing drivers license suspensions for unpaid fines and fees
- Stop sending delinquent cases to collection companies
- Text email or phone reminders for outstanding payment and court dates
- Ensuring language accessibility
- Base payment on proof of income. Hardship appeal. Sliding scale payments
- Exchange food for payment
- Comprehensive study on municipal warrants to obtain data to develop action steps to reduce warrants. Need info for policy changes. We need more information for policy formation.
- Consider alternatives to failure to pay. Some communities have alternatives. What are the outcomes and costs?
- Periodically assess diversion program entry requirements to assure equitable access.

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
