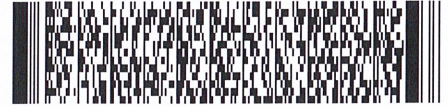

Policy Statement

Background Information

The State of Oklahoma sued opioid manufacturers, distributors and retailers for their role in the opioid crisis and subsequently received settlement funds. The Oklahoma Opioid Abatement Board oversees distribution of settlement funds. Political Subdivisions have the opportunity to submit an application and apply for a portion of these funds. Co-applicants have a higher potential maximum award. The City of Tulsa and TPS intend to submit a joint application that aims to save lives of those otherwise at risk of substance abuse disorder, use evidence-based practices to improve outcomes, invest in youth substance use preventions, promote equitable access to services and supports, and create a transparent and collaborative continuum for Tulsa's Opioid Abatement processes. A Resolution of the governing body is required to submit an application. This topic was previously presented at Council Committee on March 6, 2024.

RESOLUTION NO. _____

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF TULSA, OKLAHOMA, AUTHORIZING A DESIGNATED OFFICIAL TO SUBMIT A JOINT APPLICATION WITH TULSA PUBLIC SCHOOLS FOR THE OKLAHOMA OPIOID GRANT AWARD; FINDING EXTRAORDINARY NEED TO COMBAT THE OPIOID CRISIS IN THE CITY OF TULSA; STATING AN INTENTION TO CONVENE A GOVERNANCE COMMITTEE; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, the State of Oklahoma sued opioid manufacturers, distributors and retailers for their role in the opioid crisis and subsequently received funds as a result of these lawsuits;

WHEREAS, in 2020, the Oklahoma Legislature enacted House Bill 4138, the Political Subdivisions Opioid Abatement Grants Act (“the Act”);

WHEREAS, the Act created the Oklahoma Opioid Abatement Board (“Board”) oversight body for distribution of opioid settlement funds;

WHEREAS, the Board will distribute grant funding to counties, municipalities, and school districts to address the consequences of opioid crisis in Oklahoma;

WHEREAS, the City of Tulsa and Tulsa Public Schools are political subdivisions and eligible applicants to apply for and receive monetary grants;

WHEREAS, the City of Tulsa and Tulsa Public Schools are located in Tulsa County;

WHEREAS, between 2018 and 2021, Tulsa County was one of five counties in Oklahoma with the highest rates of opioid overdose deaths;

WHEREAS, in September 2023, the City of Tulsa and Tulsa Public Schools individually submitted the required letters of intent to apply for a grant award to the Opioid Abatement Board;

WHEREAS, since that time, the City of Tulsa and Tulsa Public Schools have collaborated to develop an application to optimize opioid abatement funds;

WHEREAS, the application aims to save lives of those otherwise at risk of substance abuse disorder, use evidence-based practices to improve outcomes, invest in youth substance use prevention, promote equitable access to services and supports, and create a transparent and collaborative continuum for Tulsa’s Opioid Abatement Program (OAP) processes; and

WHEREAS, the Oklahoma Opioid Grant Award application requires a signed or adopted resolution authorizing the application and the stated projects.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY OF TULSA THAT:

Section 1. The City of Tulsa authorizes the Mayor or his designated authorized official to submit a joint application for the Oklahoma Opioid Grant Award in collaboration with Tulsa Public Schools for the projects as outlined in the attached Exhibit A.

Section 2. The City finds there is extraordinary need to combat the opioid crisis in the City of Tulsa and therefore intends to submit a joint application for approximately \$4,257,284.

Section 3. The City of Tulsa will convene a governance committee that includes cross-sector representatives and community members, including prevention specialists, treatment providers, healthcare professionals, first responders, schools and colleges, as well as individuals and families impacted by the opioid crisis.

Section 4. Emergency Clause. That an emergency is now declared to exist for the preservation of the public peace, health, and safety and for this reason this resolution shall take effect immediately from and after its adoption by the Council and approval by the Mayor.



Project Outline:

A. City of Tulsa Management and Facilitation – Recovery Coordinator

- a. SUD/ODU prevention and intervention via city-wide communications campaign, database development, community education, prevention efforts, stigma reduction, and referral assistance with the Chief Mental Health Officer and governance committee
 - i. Create and distribute materials to first responders, hospitals, and schools for community/family education
 - ii. Create and release culturally responsive stigma-reducing PSA or other community announcements
 - iii. Create and release overdose awareness and appropriate response PSA or other community announcements
 - iv. Create and release culturally responsive family support and recovery information
 - v. Provide consultation and referral assistance to first responders, hospitals, and schools
 - vi. Establish and distribute family support materials
 - vii. Provide governance to City SUD/ODU response
 - viii. Educate and train governance to raise awareness and knowledge and increase de-stigmatization

B. Tulsa Fire Department SUD Response – Peer Recovery Support Specialists and Emergency Medical Technicians

- a. SUD/ODU crisis-to-recovery continuum with crisis/first response providers
 - i. Provide in-field overdose response by EMT and PRSS
 - ii. Provide training on MAT for first responders
 - iii. Support critical time interventions, particularly for individuals living with dual-diagnosis OUD/serious mental illness
 - iv. Provide PRSS follow up to connect individuals to treatment or other appropriate services following an opioid overdose or other opioid-related adverse event
 - v. Provide web-based training curricula, such as the American Academy of Addiction Psychiatry’s Provider Clinical Support Service–Opioids, to crisis/first responders
 - vi. Provide training on Motivation Interviewing for first responders/co-response units

C. Tulsa Police Department SUD Care Coordination – Care Coordinators

- a. post overdose/near overdose care coordination, transport, and testing
 - i. in-field overdose response and provision of overdose and fentanyl detection
 - ii. non-fatal overdose response via care coordination and transport from in-field to medical clearance to mental health urgent recovery center/treatment bed

D. Healthy Minds Zero Overdose Learning Cohorts– Zero Overdose Director

- a. Zero Overdose learning community engagement and grant activities
 - i. 3 Zero Overdose learning cohorts per year

E. Tulsa Public Schools SUD Prevention and Intervention - Impact Coordinators and Behavioral Health Aides

- a. substance use prevention and absenteeism prevention via Attendance Works, family engagement, community education, connection to wraparound supports, and referral assistance in partnership with the City of Tulsa Recovery Coordinator and local behavioral health partners

- i. Outreach and barrier removal for increased school attendance and mental health support
- ii. Leader development for substance use recovery and attendance recovery
- iii. Tier I, II, and III education, prevention, and intervention, including connection to wraparound services
- iv. Provide referral assistance to school personnel and families
- v. Provide supports for students suspended due to substance use and student support groups for students affected by substance use
- vi. Family nights to engage families around substance use and attendance
- vii. Provide Botvin LifeSkills Training program for youth social resistance skills, self-confidence, and coping
- viii. Provide Botvin LifeSkills Training Parent Program, a prevention program designed to help parents better communicate with their children and prevent youth substance use
- ix. Provide The Strengthening Families Program for parents and youth to develop skills together to increase protective factors and reduce risk factors to prevent substance use
